The barnacles of myth and cliché built up around jazz are thick and formidable. We think of it as late night music of smoky clubs and an after-hours demimonde.

We think of the quintessential jazz musician as a creature of the night – and much else, thanks to the mythology.

Well, think again. How about jazz in the morning? Not the just-after-midnight early morning, but the just before noon morning. What about live jazz in a living room? What a concept.

At a time when performing jazz musicians of clichéd imagination might have just been getting to sleep, the Kazzrie Jaxen Quartet began a living room jazz concert at her Callicoon home one Saturday in late November.

After accounting for Jaxen's Steinway grand, the drum


set, and two standing musicians, there was room for maybe 15-20 attendees, some of whom had to listen from the kitchen next door.

She added, "You'll never know how it will unfold, but you're definitely a part of the unfolding and the creation."

From legendary jazz venues such as The Blue Note and Birdland to her living room to Grace Episcopal Church in Honesdale, PA, Jaxen is at home anywhere a grand piano can be wheeled in.
